BUDGET 2019-2020

For the second year in a row, the Modoc County Sheriff's Office has come in under budget, found multiple alternative funding opportunities and increased revenue.

We pride ourselves in being mindful of spending, improving management practices to save money and seeking "out of the box" ways to fund needs of the department. This year we applied and were awarded grants, donations and created partnerships that will continue to help fund the Sheriff's Office.





Patrol Unit

Modoc County Sheriff's Office patrol unit offers 24 hour emergency and non-emergency services to the unincorporated areas of Modoc County. Sheriff's deputies pride themselves in their communication skills, knowledge of the local area and continued dedication to the people of Modoc.

The Modoc County Sheriff's Office Patrol Unit consists of 9 deputies, 1 Sergeant, the Undersheriff and Sheriff. This unit covers over 4,200 square miles of the County. Currently there are two resident deputies in Adin, one in Newell, two in Cedarville and the other deputies are assigned to central patrol.

Patrol deputies are uniquely qualified to respond to emergencies and service calls that need immediate attention, they are also the most visible and accessible part of our Organization. Their presence and engagement in the communities we serve prevent crime and reduce fear.

Patrol units routinely do school checks, park checks, animal control, assist with fire and medical calls, investigate all crimes outside of Alturas city limits and assist the coroner. They also do forest patrol, campground checks and Off-Highway vehicle patrol.

- Focus on Community policing and getting to know the outlying communities better






Modoc County operates the only jail within the County and houses 43 inmates at full capacity.




Our dispatchers are the heart of our office! They have a huge job dispatching not only for our local law enforcement including Alturas Police Department-but all Fire, Medical, Power Companies, after hours Forest Service, after hours Probation, Social Services, Behavioral/Mental Health, answer Administration lines and launching Air Ops! On top of all of this they process our CCW's, do live scans, enter all restraining orders, stolen property, missing persons, sex registrants, evidence, stolen vehicles, firearms, civil and warrants! Dispatchers are the lifeline to it all and often the hero that goes unseen!

Training is vital in dispatch and has been the focus this year. All of our dispatchers receive POST certification in their first year on the job. We have one new hire that will be attending this year. Our dispatch team has the following:

- Four out of Five Dispatchers are POST certified
- Two CLETS Certified Trainers
- One Certified Advanced Police Dispatcher
- Two Certified Tactical Dispatchers
- Two Communications Training Officer Slots for Spring 2021
- One Post Supervisor Training Slot for Spring 2021

With the help of Next Gen 911, our Dispatch Center will have a whole new look! By the end of Summer, the dispatch center will have a complete overhaul with new consoles, GPS tracking screens, updated security footage screens and soon a new CAD system.















Office of Emergency Services





Modoc County Office of Emergency Services has been primarily focused on building relationships with partners and seeking alternative funding for not only our Office but for projects benefiting the natural resources within Modoc County.

Deputy OES Director Heather Hadwick and the Sheriff saw the need to create a platform to bring all of the agencies, organizations and clubs together that deal with resources and resource sustainability. At that point, OES was going to meetings with all of these groups, but they were never all together to have the ability to collaborate at another level. Thus, the Modoc Resource Sustainability Group was born. This group is coordinated by OES and hosts quarterly meetings, an annual tour and started a mapping project.

The Sheriff & Hadwick have spoke at multiple events about the group and are excited about the future possibilities. The first year the group focused on wildfire and last year recreation. The Modoc Resource Conservation District received a capacity building grant from Sierra Nevada Conservancy working with the Sustainability group to build the program.

Office of Emergency Services had a busy year this year with recovery from a Presidential Declaration for flooding, another Governor's Concurrence declaration for Flooding two months later in 2019. The Tucker Fire was the largest fire in California last season until September of 2019. Public Safety Power Shutdown became the norm in California and COVID-19 brought our office its first pandemic and longest incident.

INCIDENT BACKGROUND

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services/Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Chinese authorities identified an outbreak caused by a new coronavirus, COVID-19. The virus can cause mild to severe respiratory illness, known as Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19). The outbreak began in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China, and has spread to a growing number of countries worldwide—including the United States.

The United States of America had declared an emergency on January 31, 2020. California declared a state of emergency on March 4, 2020. On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a pandemic. Modoc County monitored the situation as it progressed and Public Health set up their DOC on February 27, 2020. As the virus progressed the EOC was set up March 16, 2020.

Modoc County remained the last County in California without a confirmed case. .

Modoc County stepped up during the pandemic. Residents were quick to implement changes, we were able to have an in person EOC and meetings needed with preventative measures and our communities adapted their framework to stay open, provide services needed or to simply help their neighbor.

Modoc County implemented a business branch in the EOC on day 1 realizing how the pandemic would affect our small businesses. With this the Modoc Food connection was established on our website—giving restaurants, grocery stores and food programs free advertisement for changes and menus. The Sage Stage began picking up groceries and prescriptions for those staying at home, the Senior Centers all over the county tripled their daily meals, Surprise Valley adopted seniors out to families so they had someone checking on them, volunteer firefighters checked in on elderly, TEACH handed out 2000+ food bank boxes, the Modoc Mask challenge brought in almost 1500 handmade masks to donate throughout the communities. Modoc proved once again that they care, they know their needs and they will stand together and get through this.

Throughout the pandemic, our office was able to build upon our relationship with our partners at Health Services, Modoc Medical Center, Modoc Joint Unified School District, Modoc County Office of Education, USFS, CalFire, CHP-Alturas, APD, Environmental Health, CalOES, Board of Supervisors, County Administration, Social Services, Alturas Chamber of Commerce, Senior Centers, TEACH, Inc., and KCNO Radio.



COVID-19





The Sheriff's Office K-9 unit uses canine teams to assist in handler protection, the apprehension of suspects, narcotics detection and interactive public events. The K-9 Unit is primarily funded and supported by the Sheriff's K-9 Association. The team consists of four handlers and five canines. The certified deputies and K-9's train for a minimum of 16 hours per month.

This year we added two new K-9's to our team! Gnash is partnered with Deputy Ridgway in Cedarville. Deputy Ferris in Newell has two K-9's currently. K-9 Arlo will be retiring in August 2020. Ferris has been bonding with his new K-9 Jax and they will leave for training this fall.

Having K-9 deputies in each outlying community was a goal of Sheriff Dowdy's from the beginning of his term. Backup can be up to or more than an hour away in certain places in Modoc County. Having a K-9 partner gives the Deputy a sense of security and often just their presence can de-escalate a situation when response times are extended.

Our K-9's are a great way to immediately connect with the community. The unit often appears at community events, performs demonstrations for the public frequently, assist other agencies, counties and states for narcotics detection and are typically the hit of any meeting. We are so proud to have them in our MCSO family.





Coroner



The Coroner is required by California Code Section 27491 to investigate any sudden, violent or unusual deaths or other deaths that fall within the jurisdiction of the Coroner. It is the responsibility of the Coroner to establish positive identity of the deceased, determine the date, time and circumstances and the cause and manor of death.

The Coroner will decide if an autopsy is necessary. An autopsy may not be performed if the cause of death can be determined by other criteria and is of natural causes. If the deceased has been under the care of a physician, assessing the medical history and no suspicion of foul play exists, an autopsy may be waved. If a physician, family member, or other agency requests an autopsy after the Coroner has deemed it unnecessary, the requesting party will pay for the autopsy.

The Coroner Unit covers costs of autopsies for deaths that occur in the County, whether that person is a resident or visitor. Autopsies are performed in Washoe County and Siskiyou County and range from \$1,000—\$2,500 on average, but up to \$5,000 depending on the complexity. The Modoc County Sheriff's Office understands the importance of notifying the next of kin in a timely manner.

Animal Control

Modoc County Sheriff's Office is also responsible for Animal Control other than the City of Alturas. Currently, there is one part-time animal control officer. This duty often lies on our responding Deputies due to lack of funding for Animal Control.

This year we were awarded a grant through the Shasta Regional Foundation & McConnell Foundation for Animal Control safety equipment and a new animal housing facility. We were able to get some much needed equipment for our responding deputies and Animal Control Officer.

Animal Control responds to hundreds of calls each year. We pride ourselves on helping residents and visitors reconnect with their pets. Support Services

Civil & Court Security

The Sheriff's Office provides security services to the Superior Court of Modoc County during judicial proceedings. Corrections Officers and Deputies serve as court bailiffs, maintaining safety and order in the courtroom, oversee management of prisoners during court proceedings, transportation and oversee the jury during trials.



All County Civil processing is done at the Sheriff's Office. Our staff is responsible for serving various types of legal documents in both the unincorporated and incorporated areas of Modoc County. Some of the documents include small claims actions, summons and complaints, subpoenas, restraining orders, eviction orders and civil bench warrants.

We were able to update our Civil software this year! This was a huge feat as it is a very costly program, requires additional training and had specifically needed IT infrastructure that we didn't have.

Inmate Work Crew









Last spring we applied for a grant through the McConnell Foundation program. We were awarded \$10,800 to build an on-site Animal Housing Facility. Modoc County Animal Control did not have a site to house animals that was conducive to our harsh weather or safe for staff and inmates to work in if the animal was unfriendly. This shelter is heated and has the capability to separate the animal inside or out in the pen for safe cleaning and care. The site will also serve as a work program option for inmates interested in learning about animal care and basic dog training. Partnered with the High Plateau Humane Society, we hope to foster dogs in the area and train them with basic commands and socialization skills.

The Animal Housing Facility will be critical during emergency evacuations as well. The shelter was built in a way that allows for kennels to be stacked inside to house another 15 animals if necessary.

Through the Edward J. Byrne (JAG) grant, Modoc County was awarded \$656,000 over the next three years. This funding was awarded to create a recovering citizens work program training our inmates with marketable skills to reduce recidivism. Due to COVID-19, the program was delayed and only allowed to run on site projects. The Animal Housing facility build is in the back lot behind our corrections center. The inmates applied for a spot on the work crew, attended safety training and started the project in April. In one month, each inmate received a certificate of training and completion to include in their resume on the following:

- 1) Cordless Drill & Impact Drill Power Tool Use and Safety
- 2) Circular Saw Use and Safety (8 Hours)
- 3) Miter Saw Use and Safety (8 Hours)
- 4) Basic Air Tool (Framing Nail Gun) Use and Safety (8
- 6) Basic Carpentry (40 Hours minimum)
- Basic Construction (40 Hours minimum)
- 8) Basic Insulation Installation (8 Hours)



The program replaced our informal work program giving inmates an opportunity to learn new skills. This program also comes with support services such as resume building, job hunting skills, interview tips/ practice and support getting GED's, drivers license, documents and prisons were about rehabil-almost anything else that may be helpful to seek employment. Our ofitating instead of just pun- fice will work with the inmates in the program for an additional two years in efforts to reduce their chance of recidivism. In just a few need and crave meaningful months, the crew has built an animal housing facility, picnic tables, raised beds for the Community Garden, repaired camparounds for the Forest Service, replaced steps at our office, painted, installed laminate flooring and gained many other valuable skills that include selfconfidence, time management and how to be part of a team.



The Modoc County Board of Supervisors and Administration were invited to tour the facility and participate in the inmates being awarded their training certificates. The Sheriff's Office also invited local construction companies to view the outcome and see the inmates at work. Several were offered positions upon release.

The Sheriff's Posse is a huge part of the success of the Sheriff's Office. Our Posse is 78 members strong and are always there to lend a hand! Search & Rescue

PROGRAM GOALS

- Train volunteers in search and rescue techniques, survival rescue training, tracking and communication technology.
- Provide educational opportunities to public schools and citizens to insure better preparedness in emergency situations.
- Continue targeted recruitment to increase and improve Search & Rescue volunteer pool.
- Continue to partner with other agencies to expand the program and learn from each other.
- Further seek outside funding to update equipment, support training opportunities and create a sustainable SAR program.





Search and Rescue responds to and assists citizens who are overdue, lost, injured, or presumed deceased in the wilderness. The Search & Rescue Program has been revamped by the leadership of Deputy Erik VonRader. VonRader has diligently hunted for new funding, equipment, trainings and created partnerships within the County and bordering states to help support the program.

The Search & Rescue Unit is working to meet the Modoc County Sheriff's Office goal to protect the health, safety, and well being of all citizens. The Search & Rescue team is manned by staff and the volunteers in the Sheriff's Posse. This crew comes at a moment's notice, gives countless hours of their time and our Office would not have the necessary manpower to succeed without them.

This year Modoc County Sheriff's Office joined the California Oregon Regional Search and Rescue (CORSAR) group. The CORSAR concept stemmed from a joint Mission Debriefing in 2006, to evaluate how to better provide for regional communications and public assistance during major or extended search and rescue missions. The CORSAR group recognized that it needed to formalize inter-relationships and move together jointly to enhance mutual operations. This group includes: Jackson County, Douglas County, Josephine County, Klamath County, Modoc County, Curry County, Coos County, Oregon State Police, Siskiyou County, Del Norte County, Bureau of Land Management, US Forest Service, Brim Aviation, Crater Lake National Park Service, American Red Cross, and Civil Air Patrol. Their mission is to foster regional communications to provide and coordinate personnel, equipment, education, and training for the effective delivery of Search and Rescue services in the Southern Region.

This year our Search & Rescue Team received a \$10,000 donation from the Pit River Tribe, an enclosed trailer from Corryn Hinze for a mobile command unit, updated their climbing gear and new GPS units. Training on Mapping & GPS was also held in County for Posse members and staff. We are excited to see what the future holds for this team!

True leadership lies in guiding others to success. In ensuring that everyone is performing at their best, doing the work they are pleaged to do and doing it well.
